- Course Description:**
- This course will offer you opportunities to develop proficiency in modern Japanese at the elementary level. Our emphasis is on linguistic competency in four components; listening, speaking, reading and writing. There is, however, another important feature of language, which is the knowledge and understanding of the target culture. The instructor will introduce and explain new expressions and grammar patterns, give you the opportunities to practice them, and help you learn Japanese in daily situations within cultural and social contexts. You will gradually gain communicative competency in the Japanese language as a whole.
 - This course is designed for those who have completed Japanese 101. If you

have taken Japanese of this level at a different university, you must see the instructor immediately regarding placement.

- Course Objectives:** At the end of the semester, you will be able
- to read and write about 105 more *kanji*.
 - to talk about yourself and describe things and other people with a little longer sentence structures with “short forms” as well as “long forms” .
 - to describe experiences, desires and plans, and to express what you can do.
 - to compare things.
 - to use contextually appropriate words and grammar, especially the verbs of giving and receiving.
 - to have basic understanding of Japanese culture such as Kabuki, folktales, *tanabata*, and society.

- Regular on-time attendance is absolutely necessary. Participation:

- You are expected to voluntarily ask and answer the questions, present your own ideas, and discuss with the classmates and the instructor. In order to participate actively in class with accuracy and fluency, you are expected to read the textbook carefully, answer the questions in the textbook or the workbook, and learn the vocabulary according to the course schedule before coming to class. You may also utilize audio materials to prepare for the class. Make sure to review constantly, going back to the earlier lessons frequently.

Assignments:

- Workbook assignments are regularly assigned. (See Schedule.) There will be additional assignments from time to time.
- Your completed homework should be turned in at the beginning of class on the due date to be accepted for full credit. Those submitted later but before the next class starts will earn half of the credit. Those submitted even later than that will earn only one fourth of the credit. If you cannot submit your homework because of your absence, you can submit it at the beginning of the next class and get full credit. Be sure to check your daily schedule carefully.
- Papers containing many errors and/or blanks must be re-submitted to get credit.

- There will be two reading assignments. You will practice reading Japanese passages, record your reading, and submit the best one.
- The first assignment: “Sue’s diary” (pp.330-331) by February 22
The second assignment: “*Tanabata*” (p.349) by April 12

Composition:

- There will be one composition assignment. You will be asked to write two- page composition about “your college life and future” in Japanese.
- The due date is April 26.
- Details will be explained in class.

Quizzes:

- One kanji quiz and one vocabulary quiz will be held per lesson.
- The 12 best scores out of 14 quizzes will be counted for you final grade. Due to the nature of the above policy, no make-ups will be allowed.
- If you are late to class, you won’t be given extra time to complete the quizzes.

- Lesson Test:**
- The test for Lesson 10 will be included in the midterm examination and the one for Lesson 14 will be included in the final examination.
 - If you are late to class, you will not be given extra time to complete the tests. Please be sure to come on time.
- Oral Exam:**
- An oral exam is scheduled for the last class. It will be approximately for 5 to 6 minutes per student.
 - Details will be explained in class before the test.
- Midterm Exam & Final Exam:**

- Audio Material:
- If you buy a new textbook and workbook, MP3 CD-ROMs come with them. In the case that you buy a used textbook and workbook and you don't have CD-ROMs, you can listen to them at the language lab in LLB. Listen to the dialogues, vocabulary, drills, and the reading from the Reading section in the textbook as much as possible. You also need to listen to the audio materials in order to complete the listening comprehension practice in the workbook.
 - It is vital for your acquisition of Japanese to be exposed to it as much as possible. You should listen to the CD every day. Also, do not just passively listen but speak with the CD, using the pause and rewind buttons.
