Course Description: This course is a continuation of Intermediate Chinese 201 and the fourth semester in the Modern Mandarin Chinese sequence. The course places equal emphasis on speaking, listening, reading and writing to further develop the student's ability to communicate effectively and appropriately in the language. Through a wide range of classroom activities, homework and writing assignments, and quizzes and unit tests, students will build up a more comprehensive understanding of the fundamental grammar of the language, and expand their knowledge of its core vocabulary and commonly used phrases. In addition to improving the students' fluency in the spoken style, the course continues to introduce students to basic written style expressions. The course is conducted in Chinese.

Prerequisite: This course is designed for students who have completed 01:165:201 Intermediate Chinese or placed into 202 through the placement test. If you are unsure whether you are eligible to take this course or this is the correct proficiency level for you, please contact the Chinese Language Placement Advisor, Dr. Yang 杨老师 (yuanchen.yang@rutgers.edu).

Statement of Learning Goals: This course satisfies the SAS core curriculum goal AHq. By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- Engage in fairly sustained conversations in Chinese on a range of topics related to daily life, academic life, and various aspects Chinese culture, especially compared to American culture.
- Use newly acquired grammar, expressions and vocabulary in context appropriate situations, through frequent situational role-play exercises set in real-life contexts, culminating in a 5-minute group skit performance at the end of the semester. Rather than translating from English to Chinese, students will learn to structure conversations as closely as possible to those of native speakers.

- Write 200-character short essays with multiple paragraphs using appropriate connecting phrases, through biweekly writing assignments. Students will recognize that written Chinese is often structured very differently from written English, and that some expressions are more commonly used in the written format rather than the spoken format.

Course Evaluation & Requirements

- Attendance & Participation 10%
This is a language class, which means class time is crucial to your learning. You are expected to come to **every class on time** and **actively** participate in the class activities. All electronic devices must be off while class is in session. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of each class. Three late arrivals to class will count as one absence. You are allowed only two unexcused absences. Your final grade will be reduced by **one full point** for each unexcused absence beyond the first two. More than 7 unexcused absences will lead automatically to an “F” in your final grade. Absences can be excused only for religious reasons (must be reported in advance), or documented emergencies (official documents must be provided). - Daily Quizzes 小考 10%
Learning a foreign language is an exciting but also a demanding endeavor. Make sure your schedule allows you to commit to spending a minimum of one to two hours to prepare for each class. For each class, you are expected to review the materials we covered in the class, complete the assignments, and preview the materials we will cover in the following class. A short quiz will be given **at the beginning of each class**. If you are late to class, you will miss the daily quiz. There are absolutely no make-ups for the quizzes.
- Homework and Writing Assignments 作业 20%
Homework and writing assignments are due **at the beginning of class**. These assignments will consist of exercises from either the Integrated Chinese Workbook (WB in the schedule) or worksheets given out in class. If you decide to purchase the Character Workbook and use them to practice writing characters, you may turn in the worksheets with your writing assignments; they will be corrected for you. Late submissions within one week of the due date will be docked by 10% for each day they are late. Assignments submitted one week after the due date will not be accepted.
- Oral Presentations 口试 10%

Oral Presentation 2 口试二: April 30 (Monday)

You will give two 5-minute oral presentations. For Oral Presentation 1 (5%), you will work in pairs to write and perform a dialogue in Chinese. For Oral Presentation 2 (5%), you will work in groups of 3-4 to write and perform a skit in Chinese. You will have opportunities in class activity time to prepare for them. The first half of your grade will come from your pair/group effort and the second half from your individual performance.
